### INDUSTRIAL EMISSIONS DIRECTIVE - LARGE COMBUSTION PLANTS

- 1. As I trust you are aware, Article 32 of the industrial emissions Directive (2010/75/EC)<sup>1</sup> "the Directive" hereinafter provides for the establishment of a transitional national plan (TNP) for emissions of sulphur dioxide, nitrogen oxides and dust for certain existing large combustion plants. Within the period 1 January 2016 to 30 June 2020, plants placed in the TNP will be exempt from the emission limit values (ELVs) which would otherwise apply under Article 30(2) of the Directive. But they will each need to comply with an annual 'ceiling' emission for each of the pollutants concerned, calculated on the basis of the plant's total rated thermal input as it was on 31 December 2010 and its annual operating hours and fuel use, averaged over the ten years up to and including the calendar year 2010.
- Participation in the TNP is optional. The purpose of this letter is therefore to ask you to consider whether and on what basis you wish the large combustion plant(s) you operate to be included in the United Kingdom's TNP. If so, please reply as soon as possible and by 8 May 2012 at the latest but please see paragraph 14 of this letter.
- 3. My counterpart colleagues in the administrations in Northern Ireland, Scotland and Wales have been consulted about the form and content of this letter. They agree its approach and that I should send it electronically to all operators of plants which are in the current UK national emission reduction plan<sup>2</sup>. I am sending it also to the Defraconvened Large Combustion Plant Stakeholders' Group. If you know of any large

combustion plant operator who may not receive the letter in that way, please forward it and let me know.

- 4. In your consideration of participation, please note the following:
  - the TNP can cover only <u>whole<sup>3</sup></u> large combustion plants<sup>4</sup> which were first permitted by the relevant environmental regulator<sup>5</sup> before 27 November 2002 or for which a permit application had been made by that date and which were put into operation within a year of that date;
  - the TNP cannot include those plants which to which the "limited life derogation" provided in Article 33 of the Directive<sup>6</sup> applies (note that operators have until 1 January 2014 to provide the environmental regulator with the written declaration as regards operation after 1 January 2016 which is necessary for that derogation to apply);
  - the TNP cannot include large combustion plants 'within refineries firing low calorific gases from the gasification of refinery residues or the distillation and conversion residues from the refining of crude oil for own consumption, alone or with other fuels';
  - plants can be placed in the TNP in respect of one, two or all three of the pollutants that the TNP can cover. In these cases, the ELVs set under Article 30(2) of the Directive will apply to the other pollutant(s); and
  - The TNP does not apply to carbon monoxide (CO) emissions the CO limits in Annex V will apply irrespective of whether or not the plant is included in the TNP.
- 5. Please note also that all plants in the TNP will continue to be subject to ELVs which are at least as stringent as those in place in permits on 31 December 2015. Those ELVs will have been set by the environmental regulator as appropriate to meet the requirements of the IPPC Directive and, from 7 January 2014, the requirements if Chapter II of the industrial emissions Directive. Furthermore, plants placed in the TNP will remain subject to the requirements of Chapter II of the industrial emissions Directive and so the environmental regulator may need to set more stringent ELVs based on BAT and taking account of particular environmental circumstances, irrespective of the annual emissions ceilings applying to TNP plant or the ELVs prescribed in Annex V of the Directive.

- 6. There will be a single UK TNP, covering all participating plants without subdivision<sup>7</sup>. I envisage that, subject to further consultation and Parliamentary approval of the necessary Regulations, it will be possible for the annual emissions ceilings for each plant participating in the TNP to be transferred partially to other plants, irrespective of plant nature or sector. This would continue the arrangements under the current National Emissions Reduction Plan (NERP) for large combustion plants. Formal consultation on the necessary Regulations and other administrative details is currently planned to commence in the autumn of 2014. The Regulations will probably be modelled on the current Large Combustion Plants (National Emission Reduction Plan) Regulations 2007<sup>8</sup>.
- Other points about the TNP and its relationship to other provisions in Chapter III of the Directive have been raised in discussions with operators' representatives in recent months. Appendix 1 to this letter deals with them.
- 8. The TNP for the United Kingdom will be drawn up by Defra with input from the administrations in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. It will need to conform to the rules drawn up under Article 41(b) and adopted in accordance with Article 75(2) of the Directive. These rules were agreed by the Committee set up under Article 75 at a meeting in November 2011. Appendix 2 to this letter reproduces the text which was agreed: its publication as a Commission Implementing Decision is expected early in 2012 and Defra will notify operators' representatives when that happens. But Appendix 2 can be taken as setting out all the details which operators may need to aid their consideration of whether to place their plant(s) within the TNP<sup>9</sup>.
- 9. Operators should note in particular section 3 of Appendix 2 which sets out how the emissions ceilings are to be calculated for each plant. This should enable operators to make their own calculations forthwith so as to assist their consideration of whether to place plants in the TNP. It would be very helpful if, in responding to this letter, operators could send their calculations along with the other details of the plants they intend to place in the TNP. In doing so, they should follow as far as possible the format of the Tables in Appendices A and B of the European Commission document at Appendix 2 to this letter.
- 10. In any case, I envisage a process, commencing upon receipt of operators' responses to this letter, in which ceilings calculations will be performed or checked independently prior to the assembly by Defra, in consultation with the devolved administrations, of the United Kingdom's draft TNP which is planned to be submitted to the European Commission in the autumn of 2012.

- 11. Operators must also supply information on the 'measures foreseen for each [plant in the TNP] in order to ensure timely compliance with the emission limit values that will apply from 1 July 2020' (Article 32(4) of the Directive). It is of course for the operator to determine those measures, which may range from plant closure to complete refurbishment. Material in Appendix 1 to this letter may assist operators in their determinations.
- 12. A succinct statement of credible "measures foreseen" appears to be all that is required. Whilst compliance with post-TNP ELVs will be obligatory, that statement is not in itself in any way binding, although operators will be expected to inform the environmental regulator if the "measures foreseen" change significantly at any time during the preparation or currency of the TNP.
- 13. If you need any further information to assist your consideration, please contact me. I need to know by 8 May 2012 if you wish any qualifying large combustion plant you operate to be placed in the draft UK TNP. Earlier responses would be most welcome to enable a start to be made on checking information.
- 14. A decision at this stage to place a plant in the draft TNP does not commit you to participate: the TNP can be amended at any stage provided the Commission rules are observed. Similarly, a decision now not to participate is not irrevocable. Nevertheless, it is desirable that the draft UK TNP which will be submitted to the Commission next Autumn should provide a very good indication of the likely extent of the TNP when it comes into effect from 1 January 2016.

### **APPENDIX 1 – other points to note**

- A1. A plant can leave the TNP to take the 17,500 hours Limited Life Derogation (LLD) by the LLD declaration deadline.
- A2. A plant can leave the TNP before 1 January 2016 to be subject to Annex V ELVs from 1 January 2016.
- A3. A plant can leave the TNP at any time between 1 January 2016 and 30 June 2020 to be subject to Annex V ELVs.
- A4. A plant can leave the TNP at any time between 1 January 2016 and 30 June 2020 to be subject to Annex V 1500 hour derogations: it will be for the regulator to consider how the last sub-paragraph of paragraph 2 of Part 1 of Directive Annex V applies.
- A5. A plant can close upon completion of the TNP on 30 June 2020 (either in part or whole).
- A6. A plant can take the Annex V 1,500 hours derogation upon completion of the TNP on 30 June 2020: it will be for the regulator to consider how the last subparagraph of paragraph 2 of Part 1 of Directive Annex V applies.
- A7. Under the TNP, if a part of a plant is closed after 1 January 2016, the original TNP emission ceiling for that plant (based on the original capacity entering the TNP) continues to apply.
- A8. It will be for the regulator to consider in each case whether TNP plants require formal permit conditions for compliance with the IED after the transitional period. The general expectation is that the plant's permit will be varied to reflect its passage into the TNP and then varied again from the expiry of TNP.
- A9. The whole of a plant must be subject to the TNP, so only a whole plant can leave.
- A10. Where the regulator agrees that a whole plant was demonstrably not operable for example, whilst undergoing a major refurbishment during the 10 years up to and including the calendar year 2010, its operating hours and fuel use must be averaged over the correspondingly shorter period to determine its emission ceiling(s).

# laying down rules concerning the transitional national plans referred to in Directive 2010/75/EU of the European Parliament and of the Council on industrial emissions

### (Text with EEA relevance)

THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION,

Having regard to the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union,

Having regard to Directive 2010/75/EU of the European Parliament and of the Council of 24 November 2010 on industrial emissions (integrated pollution prevention and control)<sup>10</sup>, and in particular Article 41(b) thereof,

Whereas:

Article 32 of Directive 2010/75/EU provides that Member States, during the period from 1 January 2016 to 30 June 2020, may draw up and implement a transitional national plan covering particular combustion plants for which the plan shall cover emissions of one or more of the following pollutants: nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide and dust. For gas turbines, only nitrogen oxides emissions shall be covered by the plan.

- Combustion plants covered by the transitional national plan may be exempted from compliance with the emission limit values referred to in Article 30(2) of Directive 2010/75/EU for the pollutants which are subject to the plan or, where applicable, with the rates of desulphurisation referred to in Article 31 of Directive 2010/75/EU.
- In order to ensure uniform implementation of Article 32 of Directive 2010/75/EU, implementing rules should be adopted.
- The measures provided for in this Decision are in accordance with the opinion of the Committee established by Article 75(1) of Directive 2010/75/EU,

HAS ADOPTED THIS DECISION:

#### Article 1

### Combustion plants to be included in the transitional national plans

In accordance with the detailed provisions laid down in Section 1 of the Annex to this Decision, a transitional national plan shall only include entire combustion plants covered by Chapter III of Directive 2010/75/EU, taking into account the provisions of Article 32(1) and the aggregation rules provided for in Article 29 of Directive 2010/75/EU.

### Article 2

### Content of the transitional national plans

- 1. Each transitional national plan shall include the following information in accordance with Section 2 of the Annex to this Decision:
- (a) a list of all the combustion plants that fall under the plan, including all relevant information on their operational characteristics;
- (b) the calculated contribution of each individual combustion plant to the emission ceilings for 2016 and 2019;
- (c) a table setting out the emission ceilings for each of the pollutants the plan covers for the years 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and for the first semester of the year 2020;

(d) the details of the calculation of those emission ceilings.

In addition, the transitional national plan shall contain the following information:

- (a) a description of how the implementation of the plan shall be monitored and reported to the Commission;
- (b) a list of the measures that shall be applied to ensure that all combustion plants that are included in the plan comply on 1 July 2020 at the latest with the applicable emission limit values set out in Annex V to Directive 2010/75/EU.
- 2. For the purposes of point (a) of the first subparagraph of paragraph 1, Member States shall use the template provided for in Table A.1 in Appendix A to the Annex. to this Decision

For the purposes of point (c) of the first subparagraph of paragraph 1, Member States shall use the template provided for in Table B.3 in Appendix B to the Annex to this Decision.

### Article 3

### Setting emission ceilings in the transitional national plans

- 1. For the purposes of Article 32(3) of Directive 2010/75/EU the emission ceilings shall be calculated in accordance with the methods set out in Section 3 of the Annex to this Decision.
- 2. Member States shall use the template provided for in Table B.1 in Appendix B to the Annex to this Decision to present the relevant emission limit values and minimum rates of desulphurisation, the calculated contributions of each combustion plant to the 2016 emission ceilings and the total 2016 emission ceilings.

In the following cases, Member States shall, in the column of the template labelled 'comments', provide additional information on the emission limit values applied for the calculation:

(a) where emission limit values mentioned in the Notes to Tables C.1 and C.2 in

Appendix C to the Annex to this Decision have been applied;

- (b) where plants use multiple fuel types or consist of a combination of multiple plant types.
- 3. Member States shall use the template provided for in Table B.2 in Appendix B to the Annex to this Decision to present the relevant emission limit values and the minimum rates of desulphurisation, the calculated contributions of each combustion plant to the 2019 emission ceilings and the total 2019 emission ceilings.

In the following cases, Member States shall, in the column of the template labelled 'comments', provide additional information on the emission limit values applied for the calculation:

(a) where emission limit values in the Notes to Tables D.1 and D.2 in Appendix D to the Annex to this Decision have been applied;

(b) where plants use multiple fuel types or consist of a combination of multiple plant types.

### Article 4

### Implementation of the transitional national plan

In accordance with the second and third subparagraphs of Article 32(5) of Directive 2010/75/EU, a Member State may only implement its transitional national plan upon acceptance by the Commission.

Article 5

### Subsequent changes to the transitional national plan

- 1. Member States shall establish a mechanism that allows identifying any relevant changes to combustion plants falling under the transitional national plan which may affect the applicable emission ceilings.
- 2. For the purposes of Article 32(6) of Directive 2010/75/EU, Member States shall inform the Commission of any subsequent changes to the plan affecting the applicable emission ceilings, in accordance with Section 4 of the Annex to this Decision.

### Article 6

### Compliance monitoring, remedial action and reporting to the Commission

- 1. For the purposes of Article 32(4) of Directive 2010/75/EU, the competent authorities shall monitor the emissions of nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide and dust of each combustion plant falling under the transitional national plan, by verifying the monitoring or calculation data of the operators of the combustion plants.
- 2. Member States shall ensure that emissions of nitrogen oxides, sulphur dioxide and dust from the combustion plants falling under the transitional national plan are limited to a degree which allows compliance with the emission ceilings. Where there is a risk that emission ceilings are not complied with, Member States shall take the necessary measures to prevent any emissions exceeding those ceilings.
- 3. Member States implementing a transitional national plan shall report to the Commission every year within 12 months the plant-by-plant data listed in Article 72(3) of Directive 2010/75/EU for all combustion plants included in the plan.

Article 7

This Decision is addressed to the Member States.

### ANNEX

### (1) Combustion plants to be included in the transitional national plan

Parts of combustion plants (e.g. one or more individual combustion units which are sharing a common stack with other units or which are in a situation as set out in Article 29(2) of Directive 2010/75/EU) shall not fall under a transitional national plan<sup>11</sup>.

For the purpose of the second indent, point (b) of Article 32(1) of Directive 2010/75/EU, combustion plants falling under that provision also include plants which are not operated by a refinery operator, but are located within the refinery and use the fuels referred to in that point.

Combustion plants that will be subject to the provisions of Chapter IV of Directive 2010/75/EU concerning waste incineration plants and waste co-incineration plants at any point during the application of the transitional national plan shall not be included in the transitional national plan.

# (2) Combustion plant data to be included in the transitional national plan

The transitional national plan shall include a list of all the combustion plants it covers and all data concerning these plants which was used to calculate the emission ceilings.

The plant-by-plant data to be included relates to the total rated thermal input, the fuels used and the operating characteristics of each combustion plant during the time period of the implementation of the transitional national plan.

As a minimum, the following data shall be included in the transitional national plan for each of the combustion plants falling under it:

- 1. Name and location of the combustion  $plant^{12}$ ;
- 2. Date on which the first permit for the combustion plant was granted;
- 3. Date on which the application for the first permit for the combustion plant was submitted alongside with the date on which the combustion plant was put into operation for the first time;

*Note*: This information is only required in case the combustion plant has been granted its first permit after 27 November 2002, but has been brought into operation no later than 27 November 2003.

- 4. Any extension by at least 50 MW of the total rated thermal input of the combustion plant, which took place between 27 November 2002 and 31 December 2010 (indicating the capacity added in MW)<sup>13</sup>;
- 5. Total rated thermal input (MW) of each combustion plant on 31 December 2010;
- 6. Annual number of operating hours<sup>14</sup> of each combustion plant, averaged over the period 2001-2010;

*Note:* This information is only required in case where specific emission limit values for combustion plants operating less than 1.500 hours per year are used to calculate the contribution of the combustion plant to the emission ceiling(s).

- 7. Pollutants for which the combustion plant concerned is not covered by the transitional national plan (if any)<sup>15</sup>.
- 8. Annual amount of fuel used (TJ/year), averaged over the period 2001-2010, split over 6 fuel types: hard coal, lignite, biomass, other solid fuels, liquid fuels, gaseous fuels<sup>16</sup>;
- 9. Annual waste gas flow rate ( $Nm^3/year$ ), averaged over the period 2001-2010<sup>17</sup>;

*Note 1:* In the case of combustion plants firing multiple fuel types and/or consisting of multiple plant types, the waste gas flow rate needs to be provided for each of the fuel types and/or combustion plant types separately<sup>18</sup>.

*Note 2:* If the waste gas flow rate is calculated from the amount of fuel used (and not based on actual monitored waste gas flows), the factor (or factors in case of multiple fuels or combustion plant types) used for the calculation (Nm<sup>3</sup>/GJ) needs to be reported.

10. Quantity of sulphur input via indigenous solid fuels<sup>19</sup> used (tonnes S/year), averaged over the period 2001-2010;

*Note*: This information is only required in case where the combustion plant uses indigenous solid fuels and where the minimum desulphurisation rate is used to calculate the contribution of the combustion plant to the emission ceiling for sulphur dioxide (for 2016 and/or 2019).

Where combustion plants covered by the transitional national plan are gas turbines or gas engines, the transitional national plan must specifically indicate this.

### (3) Determining the emission ceilings

**3.1.** Calculation method for the individual plant contributions to the 2016 and 2019 emission ceilings

### **3.1.1.** General case

In order to determine the applicable emission ceilings for a pollutant for the **years 2016 and 2019**, the contribution of each combustion plant expressed in tonnes per year (tpa) shall be calculated using the following equation:

where:

- <u>Waste gas flow rate</u> is the volumetric flow rate of waste gases expressed in cubic metres per year (Nm<sup>3</sup>pa), averaged over the years 2001-2010. It is expressed at standard temperature (273 K) and pressure (101,3 kPa), at the relevant reference oxygen content (i.e. the same one as used for the emission limit value (ELV)) and after correction for the water vapour content;
- <u>ELV</u> is the relevant emission limit value for the pollutant concerned expressed in mg/Nm<sup>3</sup>, assuming an oxygen content by volume in the waste gas of 6 % in the case of solid fuels, 3 % in the case of liquid and gaseous fuels (for combustion plants other than gas turbines or gas engines) and 15% in the case of gas turbines and gas engines.

The details on how to determine the emission limit values for calculating the 2016 and 2019 emission ceilings are provided in sections 3.2 and 3.3

# **3.1.2.** Specific case of plants firing multiple fuel types and/or consisting of multiple plant types

The equation referred to in section 3.1.1 cannot be used for combustion plants that fired multiple fuel types in the period 2001-2010 (simultaneously or not) or are consisting of multiple plant types.

Those combustion plants require the application of different emission limit values and/or reference conditions for calculating their contribution to the emission ceilings. Hence, the following method shall be used.

Contribution to ceiling (tpa) =  $\Sigma$  [Waste gas flow rate (Nm<sup>3</sup>pa) × ELV (mg/Nm<sup>3</sup>) × 1,0×10<sup>-9</sup>]

This equation implies that, for each of the fuel types used in the period 2001-2010, the average annual waste gas volume (Nm<sup>3</sup> per year) is multiplied by the relevant emission limit value (corresponding to the total rated thermal input of the entire combustion plant). The products of these multiplications are then added for all of the fuel types used.

It must be ensured that, for each fuel type, the waste gas volume and the emission limit value multiplied are expressed at the same reference oxygen content.

The same approach applies in cases where, in the period 2001-2010, taking into account Article 29(1) and (2) of Directive 2010/75/EU, a single combustion plant consisted of a combination of different plant types. Illustrative examples are:

- one or more gas turbines combined with one or more other types of combustion plants;
- one or more gas engines combined with one or more other types of combustion plants.

### **3.1.3.** Minimum rate of desulphurisation (MDR)

The equation referred to in section 3.1.1 cannot be used for combustion plants firing

indigenous solid fuel<sup>20</sup> and which cannot comply with the relevant emission limit values set for sulphur dioxide in Directive 2010/75/EU due to the characteristics of this fuel.

For such plants, the calculation of their contribution to the emission ceiling applicable for sulphur dioxide may be based on the application of the relevant minimum rates of desulphurisation<sup>21</sup> rather than on the emission limit values for sulphur dioxide.

In that case, the contribution of the combustion plant to the sulphur dioxide emission ceiling expressed in tonnes per year (tpa) shall be calculated using the following equation:

Contribution to SO<sub>2</sub> ceiling (tpa) = Sulphur input (tpa)  $\times$  (1 – (MDR/100))  $\times$  2

where:

- <u>Sulphur input</u> is the annual quantity of sulphur (S) contained in the indigenous solid fuel which was used in the combustion plant, expressed in tonnes per year (tpa), averaged over the period 2001-2010.

- <u>MDR</u> is the relevant minimum rate of desulphurisation, expressed in percent.

The details on how to determine the relevant minimum rate of desulphurisation for calculating the 2016 and 2019 emission ceilings for sulphur dioxide are provided in sections 3.2 and 3.3.

# **3.2.** Relevant emission limit values and minimum rates of desulphurisation for calculating the 2016 emission ceilings

According to Article 32(3) of Directive 2010/75/EU, the emission ceiling(s) for the year 2016 shall be calculated on the basis of the relevant emission limit values set out in Annexes III to VII to Directive 2001/80/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council of 23 October 2001 on the limitation of emissions of certain pollutants into the air from large combustion plants (hereafter "Directive 2001/80/EC") or, where applicable, on the basis of the minimum rate of desulphurisation (hereafter "MDR") set out in Annex III to Directive 2001/80/EC. Thus, the calculation of the 2016 emission ceilings is based upon the relevant emission limit values and MDR, which would have been applicable on 1 January 2016 to the combustion plant concerned under Directive 2001/80/EC, taking into account the following provisions<sup>22</sup>.

The emission limit values and MDR shall be determined on the basis of the total rated thermal input of the entire combustion plant on 31 December 2010, the type(s) of fuel used and the annual number of operating hours averaged over the period 2001-2010. Where combustion plants have been extended by at least 50 MW in the period between 27 November 2002 and 31 December 2010, the rules for calculating the relevant emission limit values as set out in Article 10 of Directive 2001/80/EC shall be applied.

For all gas turbines included in the transitional national plan, the relevant emission limit value concerning nitrogen oxides is the one set out in Part B of Annex VI to Directive 2001/80/EC, irrespective of Article 2(7)(j) of Directive 2001/80/EC.

As no emission limit values have been set out in Directive 2001/80/EC for gas engines, the relevant emission limit value for nitrogen oxides is the one set out in Part 1 of Annex V to Directive 2010/75/EU.

For combustion plants which have been using different fuel types in the period 2001-2010, the relevant emission limit values shall be listed for each individual fuel. Section 3.1.2 provides details on the method to be used to calculate the contribution of each of those plants to the emission ceilings.

Directive 2001/80/EC allows certain combustion plants operating less than 1500 hours (as a rolling average over a 5-year period) to comply with less stringent emission limit values. The, latter can only be used for calculating the contribution of an individual plant to the 2016 emission ceiling if the average number of operating hours for the plant over the years 2001-2010 is less than 1500 hours per year.

An overview of the relevant emission limit values as set out in Annexes III to VII of Directive 2001/80/EC and of the relevant MDR established in Annex III to Directive 2001/80/EC is provided in Tables C.1, C.2 and C.3 in Appendix C to this Annex<sup>23</sup>.

# **3.3.** Relevant emission limit values and minimum rates of desulphurisation for calculating the 2019 emission ceilings

According to Article 32(3) of Directive 2010/75/EU, the emission ceilings for the year 2019 shall be calculated on the basis of the relevant emission limit values set out in Part 1 of Annex V to Directive 2010/75/EU or, where applicable, the relevant rates of desulphurisation (hereafter "MDR") set out in Part 5 of Annex V to Directive 2010/75/EU. Thus, the calculation of the 2019 emission ceilings is based upon the relevant emission limit values and MDR, which would be applicable on 1 January 2019 under Directive 2010/75/EU to the combustion plant concerned

The emission limit values and MDR shall be determined on the basis of the total rated thermal input of the entire combustion plant on 31 December 2010, of the type(s) of fuel used and of the annual number of operating hours averaged over the period 2001-2010.

An overview of the relevant emission limit values as set out in Part 1 of Annex V to Directive 2010/75/EU and of the relevant MDR established in Part 5 of Annex V to Directive 2010/75/EU is provided in Tables D.1, D.2 and D.3 in Appendix D of this Annex .

For combustion plants which have been using different fuel types in the period 2001-2010, the relevant emission limit values shall be listed for each individual fuel. Section 3.1.2 provides details on the method to be used to calculate the contribution of each of those plants to the emission ceilings.

Directive 2010/75/EU allows certain combustion plants operating less than 1500 hours (as a rolling average over a 5-year period) to comply with less stringent emission limit values. The latter can only be applied for calculating the contribution of a plant to the 2019 emission ceiling if the average number of operating hours for that plant over the years 2001-2010 is

less than 1500 hours per year.

### **3.4.** Calculating the emission ceilings

### 3.4.1. Calculating the 2016 and 2019 emission ceilings

For the years 2016 and 2019, the total emission ceilings per pollutant shall be determined by adding up the contributions of each individual plant to the respective emission ceilings:

*ceiling*2016 (tpa) =  $\Sigma$  [individual plant contribution to 2016 ceiling] *ceiling*2019 (tpa) =  $\Sigma$  [individual plant contribution to 2019 ceiling]

### 3.4.2. Calculating the 2017, 2018 and 2020 emission ceilings

The ceilings for the year 2017 (ceiling2017) shall be calculated using the following equation:

ceiling 2017 = ceiling 2016 - (	ceiling 2016 - ceiling 2019)

The ceilings for the year 2018 (ceiling2018) shall be calculated using the following equation:

ceiling 2018 = ceiling 2016 -	2*(ceiling 2016 - ceiling 2019)

The ceilings for the first semester of 2020 (ceiling2020) are half of the ceilings for 2019:

 $ceiling 2020 = \frac{ceiling 2019}{2}$ 

### (4) Subsequent changes to transitional national plans

Member States shall inform the Commission at least on the following:

(a) the combustion plants which opt for the limited life time derogation in accordance with Article 33 of Directive 2010/75/EU;

*Note:* While Member States shall communicate their transitional national plans to the Commission on 1 January 2013 at the latest, operators have until 1 January 2014 to notify the competent authority whether they seek to opt for the limited life time derogation. Thus, a combustion plant may be initially included in the transitional national plan submitted to the Commission before being subject to a limited life time derogation. The combustion plant must then be removed from the transitional national plan once the competent authority has been notified by the operator of the combustion plant about the decision to opt for the limited-life time derogation. The combustion ceiling(s) of each of the combustion plants that would fall under Article 33 of Directive 2010/75/EU must then be deducted from the emission ceiling(s) as calculated in the latest accepted version of the transitional national plan (or, if no such plan has been accepted, as calculated in the latest version of the transitional national plan submitted to the Commission).

- (b) the combustion plants which are closed (i.e. those plants that have definitively stopped operating) or the total rated thermal input of which is reduced to less than 50 MW;
- (c) the combustion plants which start to co-incinerate waste after 31 December 2015 and which would therefore fall under Chapter IV of Directive 2010/75/EU.

*Note:* As mentioned in Article 32(3) of Directive 2010/75/EU, where a plant included in the transitional national plan is closed or no longer falls within the scope of Chapter III of Directive 2010/75/EU, this shall not result in an increase in total annual emissions from the remaining plants covered by the transitional national plan.

For the purpose of Article 32(6) of Directive 2010/75/EU, Member States do not have the obligation to communicate to the Commission the following information since the subsequent changes they refer to should not affect the applicable emission ceiling(s):

- a reduction or an increase of the total rated thermal input after 31 December 2010 (other than a reduction to less than 50 MW);
- a reduction or an increase of the number of annual operating hours after 2010;
- a change in fuel use (type, quantity) occurring after 2010 (other than a switch to burning waste, which would qualify the plant as a waste co-incineration plant causing its exclusion from the transitional national plan).

Changes affecting the name of the plant (e.g. due to a change of operator) shall be reported via the emission inventories to be provided by Member States in accordance with Article 6(3) of this Decision and Article 72(3) of Directive 2010/75/EU.
